Leadership Message - Why Literacy is Vital for Your Future

Literacy is the ability to read, write, and understand information, enabling communication, learning, and problem-solving. In the UK, strong literacy skills boost confidence, expand career opportunities, and support personal goals, while poor literacy limits job prospects and career advancement.

Good literacy skills boost confidence, helping 83.2% of adults pursue aspirations and 76.7% achieve dream careers, according to the National Literacy Trust. Economically, individuals with strong literacy skills earn significantly more, even in less affluent careers poor literacy can cost you around £1,500 annually and £33,000 over a lifetime.

Poor literacy limits career progression, with 63% of men and 75% of women with very low literacy **never receiving a promotion**. It also increases unemployment risks, as individuals with low literacy are over twice as likely to be unemployed. Workers with strong literacy earn over 60% higher median hourly wages compared to those with low literacy.



Youth unemployment in the UK has risen sharply, with over 870,000 young people aged 16-24 not in education, employment, or training—a 25% increase since 2022. Contributing factors include a post-pandemic mental health crisis and a lack of skills, including literacy, which hinder employment opportunities.

Good literacy skills are vital for success and progression in any endeavour you choose. They enable you to read, write, and understand information effectively, which is essential across various activities.

KS4 students can **improve literacy** by **reading** regularly, choosing interesting materials like books and articles. Write daily in a journal or create stories to boost creativity. **Expand vocabulary** by learning new words and using them in sentences. **Practice comprehension** by summarising texts and answering questions. **Improve grammar and spelling** with online tools and by proofreading. Join **discussions** or book clubs to express ideas confidently. Watch **documentaries** or use subtitles to learn new language styles. **Seek feedback** on writing from teachers or peers. Use apps and games to build skills. Set achievable goals, such as reading a chapter daily, to stay motivated.

Sixth Formers Gain Insight into Careers with PHS Hygiene Services

Recently, our Sixth Form students had the opportunity to visit PHS, the UK's largest hygiene services provider, during a careers visit to their premises in Wickford. The visit offered an invaluable look at the various roles and operations within the company, both locally and nationally.

The day began with a guided tour of the facility, including the stockroom, warehouse, and offices. Students were able to engage directly with staff, asking questions and gaining a deeper understanding of how the different departments work together. Representatives shared insights about PHS' impressive client base, which includes prestigious locations such as the Emirates Stadium, Buckingham Palace, Bluewater Shopping Centre, and the Houses of Parliament, as well as numerous local businesses.

A highlight of the visit was an interactive workshop that focused on Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and health and safety procedures, such as handling hazardous waste. Students also participated in a fun challenge to identify hidden hygiene equipment and products around the office, demonstrating their understanding of the products use once discovered.

In addition to exploring the day-to-day operations of the company, students learned about PHS' commitment to sustainability, including how products brought in for disposal are recycled into new materials. The visit also featured a Q&A session, where students asked thoughtful questions about career opportunities within the hygiene services field, including apprenticeships and pathways into the industry.


